







The County Health Rankings & Roadmaps data release provides a snapshot of the health of each county in two summary scores: **Community Conditions** (which measure issues that can shape population health & well-being) and **Population Health & Well-being** (which measures length and quality of life). Each county is placed on a continuum from least healthy to healthiest in the nation and is categorized into a health grouping of counties with similar summary scores. The following tables illustrate the "drivers" for the health of this county.

What do these drivers mean?
The drivers indicate the measures with the greatest impact on the health of the county, according to the CHR&R model of health and county performance. Drivers labeled with a green plus sign are measures where the county performed better than the average of counties nationwide. Drivers labeled with a red minus sign could be improved and may warrant additional attention.

The top five drivers are determined by using the county performance relative to the average among counties in the U.S. and the measure weight for each measure. The U.S. County Average (Avg.) in the tables above is based on analysis by KHI. The U.S. County Avg. may differ from the value for the entire U.S. population on the front page. The Direction of Impact indicates whether a county performed better (+) or worse (-) than the average of counties in the U.S. The Direction of Impact is not determined for counties with insufficient data. 





Power & Societal Rules

Power

Power is the **ability to achieve a purpose and to effect change**. People can build community power when they organize and act together to set agendas, shift public discourse, influence who makes decisions and cultivate relationships with decision makers.

Societal Rules

Societal rules are the **written and unwritten rules and how they are applied to shape community conditions**.

Written rules may be formalized and documented in laws, policies, regulations and budgets. Unwritten rules are made up of worldviews, cultural and norms.



Example: Education

What are some potential societal rules shaping education?


Institutional Practices: Disciplinary protocols

Budgets: School budget decisions

Laws & Policies: Cell phone use policies

Worldview: Perceived importance and value of education

Norm: Language of instruction

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Understanding Power through Stakeholder Mapping

Power Analysis of the Stakeholders Involved in an Issue

- Understand how power is exercised and by whom to cause and maintain the problems and conditions that we seek to change
- Develop strategies to change power relationships and mobilize stakeholders around an issue

Recognizing which stakeholders have power to influence an issue can help you develop strategies to address the realities we face.



Stakeholder Mapping Instructions


Steps:

1. **Identify an issue** that is affecting the health of your community. What power imbalances or societal rules cause this issue?
2. **Define the competing agendas.**
3. **Identify the stakeholders** (people, organizations, etc.) that have power and influence over each agenda.
4. **Place stakeholders on the map** by their decision-making power/influence and interest in the issue.

Practice Stakeholder Mapping

Instructions:

1. **Identify issue.**
2. **Define the competing agendas.** Think about the specific context in your communities.
3. **Identify the stakeholders with power and influence over each agenda.** Consider individuals, organizations and group.
4. **Place stakeholders on the map** by their decision-making power/influence and interest in the issue
